

#### **All Saints Day**

# 1 November/All Souls Day - 2 November

#### **Class Placements for 2020**


In the coming weeks, teachers will begin the process of class placements for next year. Teaching staff will spend a considerable amount of time placing students into classes, taking into consideration a range of factors. These factors include:

- Progress of learning
- Student's individual needs (social/emotional, learning, physical, behavioural)
- Relationships
- A balance of sexes

Sometimes other factors may also need to be considered. Requests by families to have a specific teacher can have some implications for class placements. Firstly, staffing may not be determined until January and we are unable to confirm who will be teaching what year level. Therefore, we may not be able to honour all requests for a particular teacher. Secondly, by granting some requests by parents and not others, the school is placed in a position of conflict. In the interests of fairness and equity, we cannot make accommodations for some and not others. I value and respect the professional judgement of each of the teachers who will endeavour to meet the academic, social and emotional needs of students when determining the class placements for 2020.

We welcome any concerns you may have and you can discuss these with the Wellbeing Directors in the respective cohorts. I thank you for understanding the College's role in this important process. Please be assured that the process focuses on the overall learning and wellbeing needs of each student and supports them to develop a love of learning that leads to personal excellence and holistic development.


# NEW PHONE SYSTEM






## Year 8 Science - Digestive System



## **Proud to Represent South Australia**

In September I was given the opportunity to travel to Darwin NT and represent South Australia in the Australian School Sports Track and Field Championships. I was selected for this team after receiving a gold medal in high jump at the South Australian School Sports Track and Field Carnival earlier this year.

After some fund raising, where I received great support from the local community and businesses and lots of trips to Adelaide for Training, I travelled to Darwin with 65 other South Australian athletes aged 10-12 where we attended an opening ceremony, 3 days of competition, an Adelaide River Jumping Crocodile Cruise and a fun activity day to conclude with a closing ceremony.

I competed in three events,  $4 \times 100$  metre relay, shot put and my main event high jump for the 11 year old boys' age group. With the help of my coaches Aaron Toome and initially Shane Packard I went away feeling very confident.

I competed well in all events but was most proud of my high jump where I equalled my personal best and finished in the top 8, this making me a finalist. It astounded me that my personal best jumping height could be so competitive at a National Competition and I came away very proud of what I had achieved.

This experience meant so much to me and to do it all while proudly wearing my state colours, competing at a national standard and making lifelong friends was truly amazing and something I will always treasure.


