Years 10-11 Subject Selections

Senior students and their families will soon engage in subject selection conversations for next year. This is a privileged exercise as we start to consider and support post-school pathways and possibilities with students. I encourage families to engage fully in this process which helps support students make important decisions about their learning at school. Book Week

Next week is Book Week. We will engage in a week-long celebration of books to encourage and support young people develop a love of reading. The week will involve students having the opportunity to be involved in several book-based activities, hopefully connecting the readers with books, and celebrating the joy of reading. The theme for book week this year is *Old Worlds, New Worlds, Other Worlds.* A letter has been sent home to families with further details about the event.



SEQTA Engage (Parents of children in Years 5 - 12)

Over the past 18 months our school has been working towards the full implementation of SEQTA, which is an online teaching and learning management system. Currently all students in years 7 -12 access some or all of their learning through this system and teachers complete their planning and assessment in this space. Daily attendance, pastoral care and student and family information is also documented using this platform.

The next step of our implementation of this learning management system is to roll out *SEQTA Engage*, which is the web-based portal for parents and caregivers. This will be for children in years 5 - 12.

This space allows you to:

- Access an overview of learning for each subject your child studies
- Follow the learning outcomes and activities of each subject in your child's timetable
- Track homework tasks given by teachers
- Monitor your child's learning progress as their assessments are marked by teachers
- Access your child's timetable

Parents will enter *SEQTA Engage* through their login page entering the username and password that you will receive via email in the coming weeks.

As we all develop our proficiency in using this system, more elements will be rolled out. Eventually. We will use this system for reporting of student achievement, both in an ongoing and summative manner. This will help students and parents know where they are with their learning and level of achievement at any point in time by simply logging on to SEQTA Engage.

We welcome any questions that may arise as we move into SEQTA Engage.

Child Protection

At Caritas College, child protection is our highest priority. Creating a safe environment for children is paramount and is central to our schoolwide policies and procedures. Our staff are committed to protecting the young people in our care. Below are some of the measures that are in place at our College to ensure the safety and protection of your child:

- All staff and regular volunteers have current police checks.
- We teach our students age-appropriate strategies to keep themselves safe through South Australia's Keeping Safe Child Protection Curriculum.
- All staff complete mandatory training including 'Responding to Abuse and Neglect' (7 hours) and regular refresher child protection training every 3 years, as legislatively required.
- We promote strategies to minimise bullying and help students stay safe online.


Project Based Learning

Year 11 – Chemistry

The Year 11 Chemistry class spent their lockdown researching galvanic cells and have designed their own investigations looking at 'what factors affect the production of electricity by a galvanic cell?' They used their knowledge of electrochemical cells, redox and the metal activity series. Students considered the components of galvanic cells like electrolytes, electrodes, and salt bridge and decided on what they would use to construct their cells. Then they had to decide which variable to change to produce results that would answer the question posed.
